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Pauline Hanson launches Townsville offensive with pledge for every state seat

Pauline Hanson has put the Coalition on notice, declaring One Nation could capture 40 per cent of the regional vote and that Angus Taylor's team cannot win without her party's help.

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One Nation leader Pauline Hanson has launched a regional offensive in Townsville, claiming her party could capture up to 40 per cent of the vote.

The senator was in the garrison city for a charity launch for Wounded Heroes, where she met veteran families and supporters.

"The average national poll that was shown is about 29 to 30 per cent, and it's holding at that," Senator Hanson said.

"But in some of the rural and regional areas, they're predicting as high as 35, even 40% of the vote. So I'm very pleased with that".

Mrs Hanson also pledged to run candidates across the entire state at the next Queensland election to force major parties to deliver.



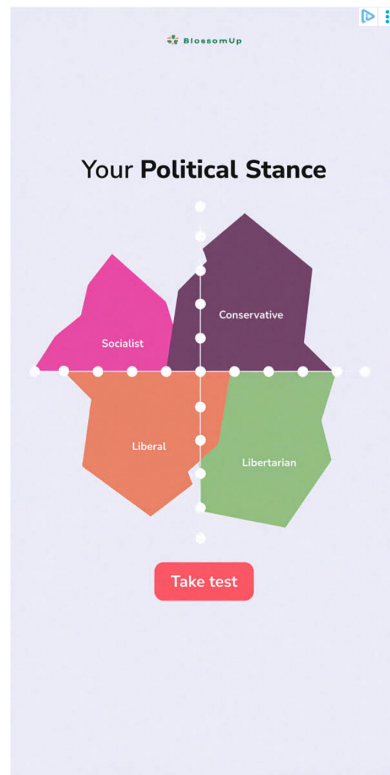

“At the next election, we will restore [stand candidates] in every seat in this state,” Ms Hanson said.

“We’ve actually forced both the government and the opposition to really do better for the people. It’s about keeping them on their toes”.

Her regional push comes as Queensland Deputy Premier Jarrod Bleijie brushed off the threat of One Nation earlier in the day, declaring the government was focused purely on delivery rather than preference deals.

Mr Bleijie said the state government was refusing to engage in early political negotiations for the 2028 election.



“The next state election is well over two years away (and) I’m not even getting into preferences,” Mr Bleijie said.

“Any of that discussion is well over two and a half years away”.

Senator Hanson warned the Coalition against arrogance, targeting the federal opposition leader and state leaders over their reliance on One Nation preferences.

She said the Coalition would fail to secure government without her party's preference flows.

"Angus Taylor needs to actually really wake up, get rid of the arrogance that's shown by some of those in his cabinet towards One Nation," Senator Hanson said.

"I'm telling you now, they will not win their seats [or] take government without assistance or help from One Nation".

The clash over preferences coincides with a battle for the veteran vote, as the state government promotes its newly launched "Veterans and Veterans Families strategy" alongside a separate \$3m state defence grant to establish the Townsville Aviation Centre of Excellence.

The state funding, matched by Aviation Australia for a \$6m total co-investment, forms part of the state government's rebranded "Defence Q" industry push, which the Deputy Premier confirmed is unashamedly aimed at signalling that "Queensland is open for defence business".

"They've actually pulled back on the funding and what I've

heard is about a billion dollars a year,” Senator Hanson said.

“And as I questioned in Senate Estimates: ‘Name me one hospital that would take a veteran now if they required that assistance.’ They couldn’t name one hospital”.

Wounded Heroes president Martin Shaw said the charity received no government funding, costing an extra \$30,000 monthly, while the charity’s patron, retired Lieutenant General Greg Bilton, revealed that daily crisis support calls had risen from nine to 27 nationally.

“They’re allowing [charities] to pick up the pieces because they don’t want to spend the money,” Senator Hanson said.

“They’re forcing organisations like this and the general public to pick up where they’re not prepared to do the job”.
